### THE WHEEL CLUB LEGACY

The Wheel Club Community Center's new look is complete following four months of remodel and repair. The City of La Center hosted a ribbon cutting ceremony on April 7, 2025 to celebrate the reopening of the community center.

The Wheel Club Community Center, originally built in 1961, has long served as a home for recreational programs for the youth and members of the community. The Wheel Club was an organization made up of community members who volunteered their time and efforts to create a welcoming and engaging environment for citizens of La Center. In 1990, the Wheel Club made the generous decision to donate the community center to the City of La Center, ensuring its continued operation and service to future generations. The city has upheld the Wheel Club's efforts by enhancing the facilities through continued maintenance and securing grants to ensure it remains a vital resource to our community. Collaboration with local nonprofit organizations such as Meals on Wheels, the La Center Arts Council, La Center United, the Lions Club, Our Days, and the La Center Library has brought meaningful events to our community that honor the Wheel Club's enduring legacy.

The recent community center upgrades were made possible with the support of Washington State Senator John Braun, Representative Peter Abbarno, and Representative Ed Orcutt who advocated for the funds to complete the project. The remodel was funded by a generous \$242,500 grant provided by the Washington State Department of Commerce, along with an additional \$80,000 contributed by the City. The city is thankful for their support in recognizing the city's mission to maintain the Wheel Club and its long-standing history in La Center.

### 4TH STREET

### WIDENING AND SIGNAL

In 2019, the city received grant state funding to design the East 4th Street widening and Brezee Creek Culvert replacement project. The grant funding required a traffic analysis to be done to determine (1) if a culvert or bridge would be most cost effective to construct over Brezee Creek, and (2) if a roundabout versus a traffic signal was warranted at the intersection of East 4th Street and Highland Road. The traffic analysis concluded the northbound left turn lane of the existing intersection was failing with an "F" level of service (LOS). The analysis then went on to compare a traffic signal versus a roundabout. The analysis concluded that either option increased the LOS to an acceptable level rating of A or B. The 4th street intersection was realigned in 2008, making Highland Road perpendicular to east 4th Street. It was prepared for the future anticipation of constructing a traffic signal, thus conduit and pull boxes were installed for wiring a traffic signal. Because both options (roundabout or traffic signal) resulted in an acceptable level of service, a traffic signal option was chosen, due to previous preparations to reduce the reduced cost of construction. The traffic signal is \$700,000,

versus the estimated cost for a round-about is \$4,000,000, thus 20% of what the roundabout would cost. The signal cost is \$6K per year to maintain, thus the ROI for the choice of a signal vs. roundabout is a 550 year payout.

In 2023, the city applied for a Safe Routes to School Grant to fund the construction of the signal and was successful in receiving a grant for funding this project! Due to grant funding opportunities the city separated East 4th Street Widening Project and Brezee Creek Culvert Replacement Project into two separate projects; 1) 4th Street and Highland Road Traffic Signal Project and 2) 4th Street Widening and Brezee Creek Culvert Replacement Project.

The 4th Street and Highland Road Traffic Signal Project has received a nearly \$1 million *Safe Routes to School* Grant. Construction on this project began October 2024, with an expected completion date of December 2025.

The 4th Street Widening and Brezee Creek Culvert Replacement Project has received multiple grants which total near \$12 million. The Breeze Creek Culvert Replacement Project is in the process of being obligated/approved by the state, after state and federal reviews are completed. Due to the type of grant funding and coordination between the state and federal level, the approval process is, and construction timeline is longer. The estimated date to bid this project for construction is September of this year, with an estimated completion date of December 2027.

### Arbor day celebration

On April 23, Mayor Tom Strobehn issued a proclamation in recognition of Arbor Day at the City Council meeting. Arbor Day is a national day of observance held on the last Friday of April. It honors the vital role trees play in our communities not only for their natural beauty but also for the many benefits they provide. Here in La Center, we are fortunate to be surrounded by trees that enhance our landscapes, improve our air quality, and provide habitats for wildlife. In honoring Arbor Day, the City of La Center has planted a dogwood tree at

Heritage Park. This tree is the first step in hopefully becoming an official Tree City USA in partnership with the national Arbor Day Foundation to grow into a community that's happier, healthier and greener.
