ARCHIVES ACTION

"Records management is knowing what you have, where you have it and how long you have to keep it."

The City of La Center was a recipient of the "Organizing the File Room" Local Records Grant from the State of Washington, Office of the Secretary of State (SOS), Archives and Records Management Division in October 2021. The city was awarded \$17,884.97. The grant provided the purchase of compliant records shelving, SOS compliant archive boxes, shredding services and a temporary staff member to begin organizing the new records room. From October 2021 to November 2022, the city's documents have been moved and organized in the new City Hall's Records Rooms, a compliant, protective environment. Before the grant was issued, records were kept in a multitude

of filing cabinets, book shelves, boxes on the floor and on sagging shelves. Documents had not been filed or destroyed under the current records retention scheduled, making it nearly impossible to locate items for Public Records Requests. With the new organization, public records requests research time has decreased significantly. In Finance, the department began with 176 boxes, 7 filing cabinets and two book cases of records. The records between Community Development, Public Works, and Waste Water started with 324 boxes, six filing cabinets and five book cases of records. When the grant period closed at the end of November 2022, Finance ended with 52 state archives boxes and the other departments ended with a total of 112 state archives boxes. There were 23 boxes sent to the Washington State Archives in Olympia and LeMay Shredding services through Waste Connections, shredded sixteen (16) 90-gallon shred bins (that equates to 1,440 gallons!).

COMMUNITY UPDATE

Through resolution the City Council has officially named the new City Hall building, The Gregory L. Thornton Municipal Building. This is in honor of previous Mayor, Greg Thornton, and the beautiful new City Hall building that came to fruition during his tenure in office. Now joining the City staff in the building as a leaser will be local company, Why Racing Events. They will be running their business out of the first floor with their main entrance on the back of the building.

The East Fork Apartment (Riverside Subdivision) buildings have all received occupancy and are available to tenants. The East Fork Apartment's Clubhouse is set to open for tenant use as it received occupancy as well. Pending various maintenance building's completions, the East Fork Apartments will be finished with construction very soon.
